We need 12 million units of blood every year but just about nine million units are donated. According to reports, there are 234 million major operations in India, 63 million trauma-induced surgeries, 31 million cancer-related complications which require blood transfusions. While talking to people at the camp our NSS volunteers spread awareness about the shortage of blood and why we must donate blood every year. Not only the NSS volunteers, our NCC cadets were also assisting and helping at the camp. Not only boys, even girls came forward and donated to blood, eradicating the myth that girls are not strong enough to be donating blood. Overall, the camp was a novel way of addressing a national cause.

Many Muslims are fast on the day of Ashura, as well as on other days in the month of Muharram, to show thankfulness. Muslims also engage in the mourning rituals, some gather at Mosques to cry over Hussain's death and to remember the importance of what Prophet's family did for Justice.
